# RESIDENTIAL SCHOOL FOR JEWISH DEAF CHILDREN

#### Eighty-seventh Annual Report, 1957-58

The Committee has pleasure in submitting the Annual Report for the year ending 31st March, 1958. The average number of children at the School during the past year has been forty-eight, four pupils left and two were admitted, one from Yugo-Slavia and the other from Southend-on-Sea.

The Committee wishes again to emphasize that the aim of the School is to educate these handicapped children to the utmost of their capacity by a qualified staff, using the most up to date methods and equipment, and thus prepare them to be fully integrated into the general community. It is most desirable that children should be admitted as young as possible and that parents should be instructed how to deal with them during holiday periods and weekends. It is considered most important that the children

should keep in touch with their homes.

The Committee very much regrets to report that in January Sir Frederick Stern resigned the Presidency on account of ill health. He has been a member of the Committee since 1912 and became President in 1933, after the death of his cousin, Sir Edward Stern. During all these years he has given valuable guidance and assistance in all the affairs of the School, and his leadership will be much missed. The Committee is very glad that he has kindly consented to remain a Trustee and to become a Life Vice President. At a meeting of the Executive Committee in February, Miss Schlesinger was unanimously elected President. Mr. Bryan Montagu has joined the Executive Committee and a warm welcome is extended to him.

The Committee records with deep sadness the death of Mrs. I. Goldstein who has been interested in the School for over 50 years. Up to the time of her death she was an active member of the Executive and House Committees, she will be greately missed and will be remembered with much

affection.

When Miss Schlesinger became President, she resigned from the Chairmanship of the House Committee, and Miss Lucas, who has been a member since 1946, was unanimously elected to that office. The members of the Committee are glad that Miss Schlesinger will still attend their meetings. This Committee continues to meet monthly at the School, and considers all matters concerning the management of the House and Staff, supervises the household accounts, receives the Matron's report and examines in detail all estimates before sending them to the Executive Committee.

The after-care Committee follows up the careers of past pupils with great interest and helps them in any of their problems. The Executive is most grateful to the members of both these Committees for their work.

Mr. J. A. Denny, the Hon. Surveyor, has given much valuable advice and assistance on all matters pertaining to the care and decoration of the building, for which the Committee is most grateful.

In July the R.S.J.D.C. Society held its Annual Garden Fete in the grounds of the School, which was not only a financial success, but was an occasion for the reunion of past and present pupils of the School and their families and friends. The R.S.J.D.C. Society's winter function was a Celebrity Concert at the Princes Theatre early in December. During the interval a very successful appeal for funds was made by Lady Karminski. In February the Society held its Annual General Meeting at the School, which was attended by some members of the School Executive Committee, as well as parents and their friends. During the year the Society made many valued gifts to the School including a paddling pool for the younger children, wire fencing for the playing field, as well as many other items listed further on in this Report.

A gift of a Hobart mixing machine with accessories for both meat and milk cookery has been given by Mrs. Harry Sacher. This has made work in the kitchen much easier. Other gifts were a new Frigidaire refrigerator, formica topped tables and a kitchen cabinet all given from the R.S.J.D.C. Society, Revolving blackboards were given by Iewish Child's Day.

In July the Annual Prize Day was held at the School. The programme commenced with sports by the children. Afterwards the awards were presented by Miss Lucas. His Worship, the Mayor of Wandsworth and the Mayoress were the Guests of Honour, and the Mayor declared the new paddling pool "Open." There was also an interesting display of handwork and children's hobbies.

In November, the Annual General Court was held in the Council Room of the West London Synagogue, 33, Seymour Place. After the election of the Hon. Officers and Committees, a most interesting talk was given by Mr. W. E. Wood, B.A., the Headmaster of the Burwood Park Technical Grammar School for Deaf Boys, on "Secondary Education for the Deaf." Refreshments were served by members of the League of Jewish Women.

During the past year, the School has been fortunate in receiving many valuable gifts of equipment, and donations for the improvements of the building. Amongst these was one for the Modernisation and redecoration of the four dormitories by the West Central Old Boys' Functions Committee.

The Hartley Aid Society held a most successful Dance in October, the proceeds of which were used to instal the latest auditory equipment for the classrooms and to acoustically treat the rooms. In December the Executive Committee gave an At Home to the members of the Hartley Aid Society, the parents of the children and members of the R.S.J.D.C. Society, when the President of the Hartley Aid Society officially presented the installation to the President of the School, and then switched on the apparatus. This was followed by a demonstration of the equipment by the teachers and children.

A full list of the gifts received during the past year is given further on in this report. For all these the Committee is most grateful.

In September letters were sent to Synagogue Ladies' Guilds in and around London, requesting that an opportunity be given to a member of the Committee to address meetings of the Guilds, to make the work of the School

better known. This has resulted in several invitations for speakers being received thus obtaining publicity and donations.

Among the donations received is one of £500 from Mr. J. Lubliner and two of £250 each from the St. Johns Wood Charity.

The Governors of the School are deeply grateful to the Headmaster, Mr. Benham, for his wonderful devotion to his pupils and to the School. He keeps himself up to date in all matters concerning the education and welfare of the deaf and sees to it that the necessary apparatus is obtained. He is ably supported by his staff whom he inspires by his enthusiasm.

Miss Ballinson has a very difficult job and the Committee records its thanks to her for her devoted care of the children. She is admirably aided by her staff.

Miss Mosely, the Secretary, has had a busy year and the Committee is most grateful to her for the efficient and conscientious way in which she has carried out her duties.

Very grateful thanks are also due to Dr. S. G. Askey, the School Medical Officer for his efficient and devoted care of the children. He is always ready at any time with help and advice. It is much regretted that he is soon to retire and the Committee wish him many years of health and happiness.

#### HEADMASTER'S REPORT

At the 31st March there were 46 children in the School, 22 boys and 24 girls. In addition to the above there were two boys and one girl resident at the school, but attending classes at Oak Lodge School.

Although we have every facility for catering for young deaf children, and we like to start their training at an early age, we have no children under the age of five at the moment.

Children are drawn from the following Local Education Authorities: London, Middlesex, Coventry, Devon, Essex, Hampshire, Kent, Liverpool, Manchester, Surrey and Sussex. We also have children from Persia, Yugo-Slavia and Belgium.

Of the children who left during the course of the year under review, three were transferred to other schools, one with a scholarship to the Burwood Park Technical School for the Deaf, and the other girl on attaining the age of sixteen entered a dressmaking establishment for training.

This has been a year of intense activity in all branches of the educational and social structure of the school. It is pleasing to report on and to congratulate these pupils who have obtained educational successes. Neil Kaufman and Jeffrey Monk both passed the Entrance Examination to the Mary Hare Grammar School for the Deaf and will take up two of the very limited number of places open to deaf children throughout Britain. Anthony Spielsinger has been granted a free scholarship to attend a two-year course at the Barrett Street Technical College, where he will study Dress Design.

In the classrooms and Assembly Hall, a new system for Auditory Training has been installed. Through the wonderful efforts and generosity of the Hartley Aid Society the Multitone Telesonic Loop System has been fitted throughout the school. Classroom floors have been covered with plastic and felt and the rooms acoustically treated. By this system, each child equipped with a specially designed light weight transistor aid is able to listen to the teacher's voice at full volume from any part of the room and at the

same time is able to move about freely within the room. Thus, according to the degree of loss of hearing, children are receiving sound and speech experience all the time, while at school. For individual speech training for severely deaf children, the Loop System is supplemented by using Amplivox Individual Auditory Training Units with which each classroom is equipped.

For completing the Acoustic treatment of the class-rooms, we are indebted to the Audio Society and the Double "A" Committee. From the latter we have also received a Ferrograph tape recorder which will be used for research work on the voices of deaf children and for improving their speech. This is the first school for the deaf in Britain to have all classrooms so completely equipped and great interest has been shown by educational journals, Local Educational Authorities and teachers of the deaf.

A general classroom curriculum has been adhered to, and to assist in the progressive teaching of language, a complete set of American text books has been provided by the R.S.J.D.C. Society.

As a result of the gift of comprehensive equipment by the same Society, the senior children are enjoying a new subject, Practical Chemistry and Science.

Educational excursions have been encouraged and the children have visited many places of interest in the London area.

As a denominational school. Religious Instruction remains an important part of the curriculum, and in addition to learning Elementary Hebrew, the children observe the Festivals and Holy Days and attend service on Friday afternoons. During the year two boys were Barmitzvah at very impressive services held at the School and conducted by the School Chaplain, the Rev. Philip Cohen. The Non-Jewish children attend a Children's Service at St. Luke's Church on Sunday mornings. The Service is interpreted for them.

The number of organised out of school activities has been increased during the year, and now includes a

Photography Club and Model Aircraft Club. Weekly Scouts and Cubs meetings have been held at the School by members of the Younger-Set Aid Society. A number of proficiency badges have been awarded.

The boys have played a number of football matches against other schools and in the inter-schools sports against Tottenham and West Ham School for the Deaf, we gained first place.

The children, staff and I are greatly indebted to all our friends, who as individuals or members of Societies, have contributed so much towards the happiness and welfare of the children through the provision of gifts and treats, which have included an outing to the seaside, class outings, parties, recreational and educational equipment. We are indeed fortunate to have such wonderful voluntary support.

Once again the senior pupils enjoyed acting as hosts at a Social given to parents and friends which followed the Chanukah Party given by Mrs. Isaac Wolfson. At Purim, following a party given by the Jewish Deaf Association, parents and former pupils were invited to a stage performance presented by the pupils.

Although there was an epidemic of Influenza, the health of the children has been good. The School attendance record was 94%. In addition to the weekly and special visits made by the School Medical Officer, Dr. S. G. Askey, M.D., regular inspections have been made by Mr. I. Spiro, F.R.C.S., the Hon. Oculist, Mr. A. T. Ratcliffe, F.R.C.S., The School Otologist, and by the School Dentist.

Visitors have included a number of Headmasters and teachers from other schools for the deaf, teachers and social workers from U.S.A., Australia, New Zealand and Germany. Madame Elath, Psychology students from Child Guidance Clinics, a party of German teachers, groups of members from various branches of the League of Jewish Women, Synagogue Ladies' Guilds and Jewish Societies. As part of their training, groups of students from a number of Teachers' Training Colleges also visited the School.

Mrs. Veal and Mr. Marsden have left the teaching staff during the year, the latter to emigrate to Canada. Miss Diamond joined the staff in September.

The Matron, Miss R. Ballinson joins in thanking the School Committee and the Secretary, Miss Mosely for their understanding and helpful advice and also the teaching staff, Matron's Assistants and domestic staff, without whose co-operation and ever-willing service the efficient running and happy atmosphere of the school could not be attempted or achieved.
