RESIDENTIAL SCHOOL FOR JEWISH DEAF CHILDREN

Eighty-first Annual Report, 1951-52

The Committee has pleasure in presenting the Annual Report for the year ending 31st March, 1952. At that date there were forty-five children at the School.

CURRICULUM

The work of the school continues to be carried on efficiently under a fully qualified staff. In addition to learning to speak and to lipread, the aim is to reach as high a standard in education as possible, to fit the children to take their place in the hearing world, and at the same time to enable them to obtain a knowledge of the tenets and practices of their religion.

Practical subjects in the curriculum include wood-work, gardening, bookbinding, and cardboard modelling for the boys, and dressmaking, embroidery and housewifery for the girls.

Parents of deaf children are encouraged to send them to school from the age of three, so that lipreading and speech training can begin as early as possible.

The fortnightly talks to parents by the Headmaster have been continued during the year. Parents are advised on the best ways of helping their children at home in lipreading, and in the acquisition of oral and written language.

Instruction in Hebrew and Religion is given regularly, and the children attend special services weekly and during the Festivals and Holy Days. Non-Jewish children receive special religious instruction from teachers of their own denomination.

OPEN DAY

This was held at the school in November, 1951, when there was a good attendance of members of the Committees, relatives of the children and friends of the School. The Annual General Court for Committees and subscribers was held first, after which the children gave a performance of an adaptation of "Oliver Twist." The senior children made and painted the scenery and costumes. Lady Karminski then graciously presented the prizes. In the evening another performance of the play was given for the benefit of those parents who could not attend in the afternoon and for the members of the Jewish Deaf Association.

HOUSE COMMITTEE

This Committee, under the able Chairmanship of Miss Schlesinger, has continued its monthly meetings at the School, when it deals with all matters concerning the management of the house and staff, supervises the household accounts, receives the Matron's reports and examines in detail all estimates before sending them to the Executive Committee.

AFTER-CARE COMMITTEE

Four pupils left the School on attaining their sixteenth birthdays and their cases were placed in the hands of the After-Care Committee. Renee Cole is learning Dressmaking; David Townsend, Tailoring; Alan Gold, who expressed a wish and had an aptitude for Cookery, is learning pastry and cake making at the

Cumberland Hotel. Rachel Lubin, whose eyesight is very defective, is preparing to enter a training course for the Blind-Deaf.

All pupils on leaving the School are encouraged to join the Jewish Deaf Association and to participate in the activities at the Club in Cazanov Road, their first year's subscription being paid for them by the R.S.J.D.C. Society.

MEDICAL

The health of the children has been generally satisfactory during the year under review. In addition to weekly and special visits by the School Medical Officer, Dr. S. G. Askey, regular inspections have been held by Mr. I. Spiro, F.R.C.S., the Hon. Oculist, and Mr. A. Radcliffe, F.R.C.S., the Hon. Otologist. The children are also taken regularly to the dentist, Mr E. Marthews.

In January, Ivan Hart, aged nine years, was taken seriously ill and was removed to hospital, suffering from a status epilepticus. He has now recovered sufficiently to be able to have a few hours' tuition daily as a non-resident pupil.

ARTS AND CRAFT CENTRE

A licence having been obtained to rebuild the bombed laundry building in the school grounds, it has been decided to convert this into an Arts and Crafts centre. Two rooms are being equipped, one for woodwork with suitable benches, lathes, etc., and the other for various types of Arts and Handicrafts. Money has been received from the War Damage Commission for putting the structure of this building in repair. It has been, however, necessary to spend the sum of £700 on the equipment and fittings for the Centre, towards which the following donations have

been received: the R.S.J.D.C. Society, £250; The Finchley Combined Aid Society, £50; and Mr. and Mrs. Kaiser, £5; for which the Committee is very grateful. An amount of £250 is still required.

TREATS

The children have greatly enjoyed a number of treats during the past year and join with the Committee in grateful thanks for the following: An outing by motor coach to Westgate-on-Sea from Mr. Monty Levy and the School Aid Society, where their host and his friends entertained them to lunch and tea. A steamer trip to Southend by Mr. and Mrs. Kaufman. A visit to the Circus at Olympia by invitation of the "Star" newspaper. "Puss in Boots on Ice" at Earl's Court from the R.S.J.D.C. Society. A Chanukah Party given by Mrs. Isaac Wolfson. In addition to these, the children also, went to the Rehearsal of the Royal Tournament at Earl's Court, and paid two visits to the South Bank Exhibition and to the Battersea Pleasure Gardens.

R.S.J.D.C. SOCIETY

The members of this Society again held their annual Fête in the School grounds in July and their winter dance in November at the Coventry Street Corner House. These functions were most successful, both financially and socially. The Society has generously paid for the returfing of the playing field at the end of the garden and has installed a Bendix washing machine in the basement, besides providing an aquarium stocked with tropical fish in the children's Dining Hall. In addition the Society has paid for some homeless pupils to join the B'nai Akivah Camp at Frensham Ponds in August, renewed the subscription for the hire of films and various suitable periodicals and has given a

donation towards helping the parents of Ivan Hart with his convalescence after his serious illness.

REPAIRS AND DECORATIONS

The Committee's thanks are tendered to Mr. J. A. Denny, Hon. Surveyor of the School, for the invaluable and unlimited help and advice which he has given during the past year, especially in regard to the successful negotiations with the War Damage Commission over the bomb damaged laundry and for the plans for rebuilding the Arts and Crafts Centre.

FINANCE

No legacies were received during the year. The Committee is very grateful for the following donations: the Isaac Davis Trust, £100; the J. E. Joseph Charitable Trust, £100; the United Charities Fund of the Liberal Jewish Synagogue, £75; the Aid Society, £50. A special effort was made, during the year to obtain more subscriptions under Deed of Covenant, and it is hoped that any subscriber who has not already co-operated in this matter, will sign such a document, which can be obtained on application to the Secretary, and thus nearly double the subscription.

THE LATE MR. ALPHONSE D. JOSEPH

In the autumn, the School suffered a great loss in the passing of Mr. Alphonse Joseph, who had for many years been a member of the Executive Committee and one of the Trustees. At all times he had been willing to assist the Committee and staff with his wide experience of communal and charitable work.

The Committee wishes to place on record its gratitude to the Headmaster, Mr. Benham, and his staff and to express its keen appreciation of the high

standard of teaching and general efficiency they continue to maintain throughout the School.

The Committee also wishes to thank Miss Ballinson and the house staff for their devotion and for their ceaseless care for the health and well-being of the children. The Committee also thanks Miss Mosely for the efficient way she keeps the books and accounts and deals with the secretarial work of the School.
