- 2 Subscriptions are as follows:

All fees are payable from January 1st to December 31st IN ADVANCE

Fees: under 18 - 12/6 a year
town members, single - 15/" " married couple - 25/members outside GLC area - single 7/6d., married 15/widows - 12/6d.
OAP's - 5/- (voluntary)

New members joining between January 1st and June 30th pay for a full year to December 31: those joining between July I and December 31 pay for the six months to December 31.

- 3 Fees are to be paid in full within two months (end of February). Unpaid members after that date who have not given a reason to the Hon Secretary for their unpaid fees, will have to pay double charge for parties.
- 4 Cases of hardship will be sympathetically considered by the Committee. Persons wishing to plead hardship should give details to the Hon Secretary or Hon Treasurer.
- 5 All non-members (Jewish and non-Jewish) to pay I/- per visit.
- The GPC consists of 12 members elected at their own AGM. They must be fully paid for the current year, they must be Jewish, and they must have been members for I year before standing for election.
- Members unable to come to the AGM who are willing to stand for election to the Committee must indicate their willingness in writing. They can stand for office in the Committee providing that their letter clearly indicates that they are willing to do so, and which office they wish to stand for.
- 8 Voting at the AGM is to be by a show of hands.
- 9 The Old Committee is to carry on to the end of the AGM when the new Committee will be formally introduced to members.
- 10 GPC members must do their best to come to the club once a week.
- Members of the GPC only are entitled to one year's free membership subscription provided that they have served more than six months on the GPC and are still on the GPC at the end of its term of office.
- 12 Complaints and suggestions must be given to the Chairman or Hon Secretary in writing. People making complaints or suggestions must give their names or these matters will be ignored.

ISRAEL HOLIDAY 1965 - Mr.Stryker's experiences and impressions. 3rd instalment

While visiting an arab mosque which has real golden Dome, we stepped out the nearby street and there another surprise befell us. Believe it or not a woman recognised me, she turned out to be a former schoolfellow in Germany whom I have not seen for 33 years.

Haifa is a busy city of workers, while Tel Aviv has the feature of a large city full of business, shops and factories. It strongly reminded us of Parisian boulevards. In some section of the city of Tel Aviv nearer its beaches, there are many big buildings and very modern places, the Habimah, Helen Rubinstein Hall, Zionist Organisation House, etc. etc.

I did not like Tel Aviv very much, it is a mixture of modern world, yet has an oriental outlook and adjoining Tel Aviv lies Yafo where there used to be an arab strong hold.

We returned again to Beth Helen Keller to have a proper look during daytime, It houses a large Club, a workshop for sewing, it has two canteens, Hostel for 30 students that attends the sewing course and several offices. There are several hearing people employed on its staff and very few deaf workers. Outside it has a large sports ground, mainly for basket ball. On the average De af visit the Club on Saturday evening, between 300 to 400 and I am informed, that on Purim and Chanuka Deaf people of all Israel come to Tel Aviv to partake in the festival annually. They have a dramatic display and award the best prizes to outstanding performing actors.

OXFORD OUTING JULY 18th

About 70 of us went to Oxford as the guests of the Oxford Jewish Community. After leaving Stamford H ill, the two coaches went to Golders Green to pick up some local members. And then through the lovely countryside with Aubrey Cohen excitedly pointing out buildings etc. at High Wycombe and West Wycombe which he and his wife know well as they used to live there during the 1939-45 war. At one point in the country, we had to make a slight diversion as the police were photographing some marks on the road. Later on in the evening, I read in the Stop Press column of the "Sunday Express" that a woman had been killed in a car accident at that spot.

Twisting among the narrow roads of Oxford, we arrived at Manchester College on time and were welcomed by Mr.Silver, President of the Oxford Jewish Community. Entering the Hall, we sat down and listened to his speech of welcome which was interpreted by Mr.Hunt, Welfare Officer to the Oxford Deaf. Mr.Silver said that there are about 100 families in Oxford, and while they need a new Shool and Community Centre, they are too few to be able to pay fully for the new buildings themselves, and hoped that other Jewish people living in the big cities would help the Oxford community. I agreed with him and think it is time that those who live in the big cities stop building bigger and bigger buildings for themselves, buildings that are not used much, and start to help the small Jewish communities scattered all over the country. Mr.Silver then presented a certificate for 50 trees in the Churchill Memorial

Forest to Rabbi Gershfield to mark his departure for the U.S.A. Then we had a good slap up lunch which the Jewish Youth Club helped to serve, and I was not surprised to see the J.D.A. wolves and sharks forget the London "birds" as they made sheep's eyes at the girls! After lunch we divided up into 3 parties and were shown round some of the colleges by official guides. From the roads, Oxford was not much, but go inside the colleges and onto the gardens and one sees the jewel that is Oxford. At Magdalen College the guide took us to the river and showed us the tower from which the Choir was wont to warble in the early mornings of May. That college has a small herd of deer that has been in existence for about 200 years. After vainly trying to stroke the too shy deer, one young lady declared that it's name must be Myer Solomon! After seeing other colleges, we went back to Manchester College for tea. We had just finished, when in staggered Harold Fallman. Drinking near cold tea, he said that he was with the first party and turned aside to film something and then found his party had disappeared. He swooped in and out of gates and doors. There are about 33 Oxford colleges and he claimed to have been in and out of 54 of them before he came to the right one. After farewell speeches by Lord Segal and Mr.Silver we went back to our coaches and home.

Israel Holiday, 1965. Mr.Stryker's experiences and impressions. 4th instalment.

The Official of the H elen Keller Home are very strict and they demand that the deaf attends and watch closely the speeches. They don't tolerate any indoor games or conversation while speeches are being made. The reason is that often programmes are weekly annouged by sign language. On such occasion I witnessed the Eve of Independence. While Mrs.Kaufman related to the large audience the history of the Israel War for Freedson, some deaf indulged in conversation and were immediately strongly rebuked by the Chairman. Even Chess players were told off to pay attention. After Mrs.Kaufman ended, an immigrant from Poland, Jaacob Baldongren related his life of persecution and antisemitism in Poland and that he was a free man to enjoy complete freedom with his family in Israel.

Before all speeches ended I thanked the Israeli for their warm welcome afforded to us and that it was a most memorable holiday with them. They expressed greetings to members of the J.D.A. and hope in future years to strengthen closer bondage.

Before leaving Israel, we made another tour to Sodom, Ein Gev and the Dead Sea, Alex was with us again on this tour. En route we stopped at Beer Sheba, which welcomes you with many camels and it is a very clean town. The roads were newly constructed and built by arabs. On most of the way it was sheer sandy desert and on some spots of the roads there were many great stones blocking. The route was most boring as all looked alike. We reached Sodom, which is the hottest spot in Israel, few tourist venture their outing there, yet many come here only to bathe in the Dead Sea as it can cure people of bodily illhealth.

We returned to Europe via Rome and Paris. We received the usual chilly reception from the English Climate.

We are pleased to convey to you personal greetings from Moshe Flakowitz, who visited you years ago, as well Ida and Benno.

Lets hope that some of you will have a wonderful adventure within years to come.

Israel Itzkowitz writes:

You may be surprised to know that there was a tramway along Portland Avenue between the church (now demolished) opposite the Jewish Blind Society and Clapton Common. I think the tramway was never electrified. The G.L.C. Schools Supplies Warehouse at the corner of Darenth Road and the middle of Portland Avenue was then the Tramway Depot where the horse-drawn tramcars were kept. I am sure that many of you have seen the word "Depot" at the top of the gate at the corner of Darenth Road. The junction of Portland Avenue and Darenth Road is still cobbled today. - Not so long ago I went to Clapham Transport Museum to inspect the interesting exhibits. I studied the 1895 Tramway Map which told me that there was no tranway between the Western and of Amhurst Park (Seven Sisters Road) and Clapton Common (Portland Avenue) before 1895. Stamford Hill was then the country junction with a very few small houses and perhaps some inns. The Tramway Depot was replaced by a bigger Tramway Depot (now Stamford Hill Bus Garage) opposite the United Synagogue in Egerton Road. I do not know the proper date for the change over.

I am sure that many of you will be interested to know of the changes in the neighbourhood of our Club in Cazenove Road.

TRIP TO ISRAEL - JUNE 4th 1967

Isadore Schlisselman asked us to correct the date of the Journey to Israel. In our last News Letter we mentioned June 5th but this is not correct. Isadore's party will leave London Airport on June 4th and return on June 18th. He has also arranged a Slide Show ("Visit Israel") which will take place at the Avram Gottlieb Hall, Montague Road Beth Hamedrash, Montague Road, London, E.8. on Monday 6th March at 8 p.m. and cordially invites everyone to come.

Israel Itzkowitz is very interested in the history of transport and has done some research on this subject. Here is his very interesting contribution to this News Letter:

ABOUT TWO VANISHING BUS ROUTES

In 1912 the London General Omnibus Company (Predecessor of L.P.T.B.) introduced the Bus Route No. 48, which was running from Tottenham to Stockwell via Kingsland Road, Old Street, Clerkenwell Road, Chancery Lane, Waterloo Station, and Kennington Road on the way to Stockwell and later in that year it was extended from Stockwell to Merton.

In 1915, the Bus Route No. 48 was suspended owing to the petrol restrictions in the Great War I.

In September 1919, L.G.O.C. introduced the Bus Route 67 which was running from Stamford Hill to Raynes Park via Route No. 73 of today to Angel, Rosebery Avenue, Chancery Lane, Waterloo Station, Elephant & Castle, Stockwell, Clapham Common, Nightingale Lane, South Wimbledon and Kingston Road.

From 1937, the Bus Route 67 became shortened and then re-shortened until 1958. In that year No. 67 was suspended owing to the bus cuts after the bus strike. If the Club at Cazenove Road had opened 45 years ago - after seeing children on Parents' Visiting Day, at the Jews' Deaf & Dumb Home at Nightingale Lane - members would have been able to catch a No. 67 bus to Cazenove Road without worrying about a change but it would have taken them $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours owing to the slow running of the bus which had solid-tyred wheels and worked at only 28 H.P. rating.

But the club was still undreamed of until Sunday May 27th 1951.

ISADORE SCHLISSELMAN

For the Newsletter of April, 1967 Story about 187, Stoke Newington High Street.

In 1825, a small house was opened in Church Street as a hospital. The scheme proved so useful in 1830, the Invalid Asylum had noved to the house in the High Street during the reign of King George IV (1820-1830) whose niece Princess Victoria was then a pretty child of 10 years. I am unable to say if the house was opened at Stoke Newington before or after the death of King George IV.

The house was called "Invalid Asylun for the Recovery of the Health of Respectable Women" which was principally supported by voluntary contributions. The house continued to serve its purpose until after the First World War with places for 26 patients

The house is perhaps best remembered as Stoke Newington Hospital for Women. It was believed the house was always gaslit. At the time of the opening of the house, there was no tranway, no railway and not even horse-bises but very few horse-stagecoaches. The house is a fine example of Georgian architecture and is on the preservation list of the Ministry of Housing and Local Government.

The house, which nost of you have seen many times, now stands scared-looking and enpty. Please do not look up at the scared-looking house at night otherwise you may get a scaring dream. It is believed that in the future it will be converted into a museum or art gallery but I cannot say when. If so, it will be the nearest museum or art gallery to the Club, Cazenove Road, - only ½ mile away.

THE STORY OF CAZENOVE ROAD

I would have written about the story of Cazenove Road in the May Newsletter, but my illness prevented me from writing. Do you remember the story "The railway that never was"?

It happened in 1863/64. In March I studied the map of the Board of Works for the Hackney District showing proposed railways. Metropolitan District Railway was proposed to be built from west of Hornsey to the south of Stratford, perhaps via Finsbury Park Railway Station, the south side of Lordship Park and Manor Road (No. 106 and 106a buses pass through), the proposed bridge over Stamford Hill, the land at or near the site of Egg Stores, the land of Cazenove Road, possibly rear of the Club gardens, the south of Clapton Station, and over Lea Bridge Road. The map did not show the area fully. The railway bridge was planned over Stamford Hill because it was thought it would not interfere with the present railway (now electrified). The present railway was in existence in 1842 and ran through the tunnel at Stoke Newington, between Stamford Hill and Cazenove Road. In fact, Cazenove Road itself did not exist until about 1866. This is the railway that never was.

I have received a letter from Shoreditch Central Library, dated April 5th. It said: "Cazenove Road was built about 100 years ago. The name was approved in 1866. A Hackney directory of 1872 fails to list any residents, although details are given for neighbouring streets; this suggests that the area was not built up till later in the century.

At first the road was called Didlington Road and renamed Cazenove Road in honour of the Cazenove family, local residents and Businessmen. Philip and James Cazenove were living in Clapton as early as 1843. Before Cazenove Road was built the land formed part of the Tyssen estate, and was almost certainly for farming".

The story of Cazenove Road, continued:

The Centenary Supplement of Hackney Gazette and North London Advertiser 1864/1964 states: "Cazenove House stood almost opposite Cazenove Road in a private road away from the main road across Clapton Common".

It is known that Cazenove House was pulled down, and replaced by the modern blocks of flats after the war (1939-45). Philip Cazenove was the head of the local firm of P.Cazenove and Company (1800-1880) but I do not know what the firm made. It is thought they made paints.

That is why I tell you there are no other names like Cazenove Road in the Greater London Council. If you look at your map, you will see there is only one Cazenove Road.

This is not a full story.
