The following letter was given to me by Myer Solomon and if it shunds a little stern and critical I print it in full because it deals with a rather important matter. I would like to point out that fire escape doors are open now on Sunday nights and we shall have to find one or two people responsible to see that they are opened and closed again after club regularly.

"The Fire Drill that never was" I read with interest the article in the September Newsletter on the fire drill for August 9th and would like to make some comments on it. night I arrived at the Club late and saw only the tail-end of Sub-Officer I stayed on at Smith's talk. Then most members went down to the canteen. the J. Cohen Hall chatting to some members when I saw the red lamp flashing. I do not know as to whether it was just the alarm system being tested, or a fire-drill or a real fire.

We then went to the entrance hall where Sub Officer Smith said that we should go to the back garden, but it is a long way there so I went to the front area Eventually we drifted back. and waited with some of the other members.

In the September newsletter article the sentence "All the back exits were ready and unlocked" gave the whole thing away and turned the fire-drill into a grotesque farce, and a very frightening one at that. Why? Because the back exits had to be "unlockedand ready" for the fire-drill.

That is not so on any night the club is open. I had a look round the Club House and noticed that almost all the windows and doors in the basement are locked solid hard with anti-burglar locks. It is the same with the Goldstein Lounge and J.Cohen Hall. The J.Cohen hall's french doors have acess to the flat roof of the canteen from where one could go down the fire escope stairs to the back ground.

What good is that when the french doors are locked top and bottom with antiburglar locks. Are the keys ready nd accessable to responsible persons such as those of the G.P.C.? No. Where are the keys? In the office. the office always open so that the keys could be got at quickly? No it is mostly locked up.

Also, the double doors leading to the canteen opens inwards to the canteen and can't be pushed outwards from the canteen. In the event of fire in the kitchen, you can't expect the members to move quietly and calmly out.

Most likely they will rush at the inwards opening doors and get jammed up.

I have speken to some resposible persons about this danger and was smiled on and told'it is known' - but with a shrug and upraised hands. It's about time that the G.P.C. were told as to what to do in the event of a fire and see to it that the G.P.C. officials should go quickly to all floors an rooms to see that no one gets left behind thinking it is just another sillyfiredrill. The anti-burglar locks should be unlocked on every club night and locked up afterwards. The G.P.C. may consider it more work for them going round the doors and windows but hard work kills no one.

I am very much aware that many people will consider me to be a troublesome scaremonger but remember the saying "For the want of a Nail".

Myer Solomon writes:

"YOUR POLICEMEN ARE SO WONDERFUL"

The above saying gushed out by so many Hollywood Film Stars and grudgingly untered by tight lipped tycocns are no empty mouthed tributes to the "English Bobby". Down the years, he has learned that the best way of dealing with the General Public was by tact, patience, display of good humour and treating everyone as equals. How so much different from most foreign police forces which rely mostly on carrying side-arms, steel helmets, doberman dogs, water cannons and vague threats of house-arrests, chain gangs, MACE, NKVD, BOSS, JDA, OGPU and other initials.

Yet the early form of the English Police did'nt get off to a good start as the Bow Street Runners were'nt paid regular wages but had to depend on rewards offered for arresting criminals and recovery of stolen goods which tends to make some of them somewhat over zealous in arresting anyone, anyhow, for this crime or that.

Eventually the English Ploice gradually improved its image, vis-a-vis the General Public, although they both still have a love-hate relationship with each other.

Whenever you are stopped for speeding or passing a red light when driwing, you would mostly mutter that there are too many of these blue bottles buzzing about and why does not seneche use a flit-spray on them.

But- When your little ones get knocked down on the roads or your house broken into and you precious belongings robbed and despoiled what would you do? Most likely you would screech 'Where are the Police? They are never around whenever they are wanted'. You can't have it both ways. In order to have your full freedom from fear of injury or mayhen at home and away, you must be prepared to give up a little of your freedom to the Police, although how little of this freedom you should be willing to lose is something I can't say for sure. Neither, I suspect, does Inspector Wallace of Stoke Newington Police Station who came to give a talk on "The Policemen".

First tracing the early history of the police force, he mext explained the multi-faceted sides of the force and how each different sections co-operation with each other helped them to maintain peace and order.

Then we saw a film chowing what a recruit had to go through at the Police College, his early days on the beat, in the company of an experienced constable. These shots taken with a telephoto lens showed him nearly run down through looking at a bended-over mini skirted girl, dealing with an elderly Indian who could'nt speak English and wanted to go to the 'Gentlemens'. Long hours of boring paper work at the station, tactfully agreeing with a nut-case that he is indeed a king, coming up against a vociferous colcured woman with three children whom he cowardly handed over to a policewoman.

And then-back on the beat, grabbing a would-be suicide, dealing with a road accident, skinheads, and helping a distracted woman to catch a "sweetie sweetie darling budgie" that that escaped from its cage.

The film ends with a thrilling episode that shows how co-operation between the foot-police, police cars, dogs, and radio communications helped to trap a gang being tracked down with a stolen Juguar one by one at a power station and ends with the last man shouting at a dog-handler with his alert, snarling alsation, to keep "that b.... dorg orf me.

Real tragedy came latterly to the policeman Mike Davis who acted the lead in the film, when he was fatally stabbed at Wimbledon Common in 1969.

Nowadays one realizes the esteen held by the general public for the Police Force when one remembers the wave of anger, and horror that follows the killing of 3 policemen outside Wormwood Scrubs, The Police Inspector at Yorkshire and also the nurder of P.C. Gutteridge who was deliberately shot in both eyes.

The Police Force had indeed raised highly in the public's eyes since the early days when an Old Bailey Judowho blandly returned a verdict of Not Guilty on a man who stabled a police sargeant in front of many witnesses was carried out shoulder high amid great acclaim.

Letter from Michael Corney

SUMMER SCHOOL AT KELSTON PARK IN BATH

On August 29th I was the only member of the J.D.A. to go to Bath by train from Paddington Station. The journey took me about $l^{\frac{1}{2}}$ hours. I walked along the corridors to find if any deaf people were there, but could not find any.

On arriving at Bath I walked out of the station and saw steep hillsides covered with oak trees and houses, hotels and buildings, and it looked like a foreign country. I walked towards the bus station, which was quite unusual, unlike London Transport bus stations. It had a long single platform under the roof were separate boards for different counties arranged in alphabetical order. As I was about to enter the bus, I met Tony from Luton and we chatted happily on the way to Alston Park Training Centre.

When we got off, we saw to our anazement, a long, long, path to the ancient country house which dates from 1773, inside a park of 4000 acres in which were Herds of Cattle grazing. We would have had to walk there, but luckily a foreign motorist from West Germany picked us up and gave us a lift to the Hall. There we met deaf people from Newport, Surrey, Blackpool, Bexley and other placed. Everybody was very friendly. We were greeted warmly by Miss Margaret Moore, our Further Education Officer, and by Mrs. Sheavyn.

At 6.30., we enjoyed a very nice supper, and there I met Ivan Hart who had arrived before me.

After supper we discussed programmes for the coming week. After that we went down to the modern dimly-lighted coffee bar in the cellar. Later on, feeling tired, we went to the bedroom which had 5 and 6 single beds with long strip fluorescent lights on the wall for reading.

On Sunday morning at 8.30., some of us went for a walk along the narrow pavement.

We enjoyed an outing by coach to the Wildfowl Trust in Slimbridge, near Bristol, although the journey took about two hours. Slimbridge is a very pretty place, with a lovely river. The Wildfowl Trust contains more than 130 foreign species. We photographed as many as we could. Everyone has seen white storks but here there were different, bright red storks and beautiful and many rare fowls with lovely colours, all being looked after and kept safe from extinction. We all know the common swans, but here one swan was as big as a man. Acrow Engineering Co., has presented scaffolds covered with a windmill-like frame, but of course without sailing arms. We climbed this structure, which gave us extensive views over the park. After walking round the park, we returned back to our Hall for supper.

In the evening Mrs. Sheavyn gave us an interesting talk with coloured slides about Somerset's lovely countryside, where she lives. We enjoyed games, and three different people took turns in making coffee and selling confectionary to us every day.

On Monday morning our activities included swimning, walking, archery and canoning and we chose those we wanted. Some of us walked across the hills under the bridge of the disused railway and rested beside the pretty River Avon with rows of boats floating on it's, unfortunately polluted waters, then we struggled up the steep and slippery grassy slopes to the main road and across it to the footpath bringing us back to the Hall for lunch.

After lunch, we changed from walking to archery, Mr. Verney our interpreter explained to us from an instructor, how to use the bow and warned us of 'do's' and 'dont's'. In the garden beside the house we shot the arrows towards the targets of about 30 yards. I thought it was fun. Sometimes our Archers hit the gold centres. A Welsh deaf girl had practised archery for well over one year and is now a second-class archer. She streched her expensive bow with both her hands and flicked her right hand freely and threw it back beautifully. Her arrows hit the best across and her shooting was admired. She helped us a great deal with the instructor, who thought she was a very good archer.

On Tuesday morning, at 9.30., we boarded the coach for Wells, where we visited the famous Wells Cathedral. It has a narvellous clock with two sets of horses. Our coach then took us on to Cheddar. After eating sandwiches etc., in the coach, we toured the caves in the darkness, with water dripping slowly and forming the hard mineral called Stalactites. We then visited Weston-super-Mare, but could not swim in the sea because of the wind, so we went swimming in a freezing cold open-air pool, but we enjoyed ourselves all the same. Some of us walked and looked around the place. Before we returned to Bath we tried to cross the famous Clifton Suspension Bridge built by Brunel and finished in 1864, but our coach was too heavy for the bridge, so we strolled along it. It has been re-fitted and restored. We felt tired and ready for home. On our arrival, we found a nice supper awaiting us.

The committee of six had arranged a Tennis Competition each evening until Friday.

As the weather was sometimes good, we tried swimming, walking or archery and practised them a lot.

One evening the Rev. Bean lectured us about "Bath in Roman Times" for over an hour.

The next day we visited the marvellous hot spring bath under the present road surface and a large hot pool with pillars supporting the ceiling. On the street, when you are thirsty, you can drink hot spring water from the fountain.

We toured the City of Bath, including the famous Bath Abbey and Georgian House where famous persons such as Charles Dickens and Disraeli lived. We stopped for high tea in the garden with avairies of beautiful birds. When you said 'Hello' to a parrat, it replied 'Goodbye' which was a surprising answer. We then returned home for supper.

After supper the Rev. Canon T.M. Sutcliffe talked to us very clearly and explained how Gallaudets was begun. It is the famous Gallaudets College in U.S.A. After that we paid our usual visit to the coffee bar in the cellar or watched the Tennis Competition.

On Friday morning we all watched the short film "Cathy Come Home" about social problems. After seeing it, there was an interesting discussion group and we talked in small groups of four or five about how we could help Cathy and her family etc. Then each of the groups explained its views to the whole meeting.

The next afternoon was fine and we all went shopping in the City of Bath for gifts for our family and friends and had a last look round its streets and the Museum and the Abbey.

On the last evening of the week, we all nervously gave our pictures for the painting competition. Then some of the good pictures were put on the board. We invited our Warden, his Wife and friend to judge them. They found the best picture and named the person who was responsible for the painting, competition which rather embarrassed the judges as everyone burst out laughing.

Then we danced to music and were given exciting games, different to those in London. We really enjoyed our last pleasures.

Later we packed our luggage for home. Next morning, all very tired, we photographed each other or the whole party and then we said 'Goodbye' to the B.D.D.A. leaders.

Myer Solomons writes on the talk about juvenile courts, given by Mr. Alan Silverman, J., on Wednesday, 14th January.

" GUILTY OF NEVER DONE IT, SIR ".

Not all children are angels or holy terrors. Some are good, some bad and there are always the small group for which there is generally no hope of reforming. It is this constant variety of Humanity that interested Mr. A. Silverman greatly in his work as a Juvenile Court magistrate. Also the children are differentiated by their family surroundings or the suburbs in which they live. Thus in the closely knitted family community of Tower Hamlets, the child caught committing misdemeanour would go quietly and stay friends with the policenan who caught him

and whose father probably caught his father doing the same. Whereas in White City it can be "daggers drawn" between the youth and the Police, and in Camden with its large Cypriot, Greek and coloured immigrant population. The juveniles want to be free like their English schoolmates but whose parents, rigid with the customs and traditions of the countries they came from, forbid and insist that the children stay at home and go the way of their parents. Thus, torn between different worlds they could go bad or crack up, and sometimes had to be taken into the court's care for their good.

London is the Magnet of England for runaway youngsters and the West End with its bright lights, garish attractions and doubtful entertainments is one large screhead for the police, probation officers and magistrates. Many time a small policewoman would go up to a hulk of a lout smelly, with unkept greasy hair, scruffy beard, torn jeans and leather jacket all hung up with chains, iron-crosses and swaztikas, and tell him that his is wanted at the police station and to come along, whereupon the surprised erstaz "nazi" would meekly follow, knowing that to be forcibly hauled along by a mere policewoman would invite ridicule by his eestwhile companions.

In common with other magistrates and judges in England, juvenile court magistrates are not allowed to know an offenders past record, if any, until the offender had been found guilty.

Once Mr. Silverman and another Jewish magistrate were complacently congratulating each other at the reflection that so few Jewish juveniles were ever up before the bench, only to realise that the next offender up before them is a Jewish girl caught shoplifting on Yom Kippur!

In these post war times of broken homes or with both parents at work, and the children left out to wander about with the front door key on a string round their necks, it is difficult to make a child understand that to take anything they want without permission or payment is stealing and not to be done.

Mr. Silverman once wanted to lecture a father on nct giving much of his free time to his erring son, but on reading the Probation Officer's report, discovered that the father is a long-distance lorry driver who has to be away most of the week. What is there to say?

During a reception held abroad the Royal Yacht "Britannia" for the Press corps, he happened to drop a glass of whisky at the Queen's feet. While the Queen, tactfully went on talking, and the waiter mopped up the mess, Reed'sface went red and stayed red. The other pressment edged away.

At another time, dressed in morning suit and grey topper with camera inside it at Ascot, he was summoned to the phone and ordered to the London Airport to catch any plane anyhow to Greece to photo the devastation of an earthquake among the Greek Islands. hours of cooling off inside a brig(prison) of an aircraft carrier and "hijacking" the personal plane of the U.S. Secret ry of State Dean Rusk, he staggered into the offices of the Daily Mirror only to have his Editor shout at him "Where have you been so long and where's the photos".

Many years ago he took a photo of a cat and happened to snap it when it was winking with one eye. Some time ago he took more photos of another cat of the same family and on looking through the photos he was amazed to see the same thing all over again. Full of justified pride he took the 2 photos to the Editor who merely grunted "Huh, what, have you poked the cat in the eye again?" Mr. Reed was full of admiration for the Queen during her State visit to S. America. While everyone around her was sweating and wilting in the high temperatures and stifling humidity, the Queen continued to look unruffled and enchanting making everyone everywhere feel he or she was the person the Queen had travelled thousands of miles especially to meet.

After his talk Mr. Reed showed us many photographs he had taken over the years. They were fascinating and varied and its a great pity that he couldnt claim the copyright to them since he took them during his work for the Daily Mirror and therefore the copyright belongs to them. Those members who didnt turn up for the talk dont know half of what they missed since the above incidents were only a few of the many he todd us.

I wish them a pleasant and peaceful trip to Israel and they should return home safely.



I only can repeat that those who dropped out have missed a golden opportunity as this tour so magnificently organised by our very esteemed Dora Margulies was indeed a living souvenir itself and it will always remain in our heart as one of the finest holidays the group were lucky enough to taste. Dora did a splendid job in guiding us throughout the whole holiday and deserves many praises. Thank you again very much dear Dora and hope you will organise a similar trip to Israel in the near future.

Two days after our group left Israel, Chain and Masel Apter became the proud grand parents for the first time. (Grand daughter).

Demama, The Israeli Newsletter will be posted in future direct to those who have paid for them or ordered. To those who have not paid yet, are advised to send direct the subscription 5 llrs as instructed in the leaflet.

The Niv School for the Deaf, situated in Tel Aviv.: While most of the group went on a shopping touror to the beach, Jane, My Aunt from Boston U.S.A., Hava, and myself went on a factfinding to this beautiful schools We were warmly welcomed by the Principal Mrs. Chanah Goldgart, who intruduced us then to her assistand director Mrs. Lavi. Mrs. Goldgart who spoke English and German fluently gave us the insight of the system used in the school. Of about 150 day pupils attending this school, some came from Tel Aviv others from the suburbs and about 30 neighboring towns. Transport is provided by the local community. This school caters for pupils from $5\frac{\alpha}{2}$ to 16 on a comprehensive oral system and to those who can hear a little, are fitted with aids. There are 14 classes and I was staggered to learn that the teaching staff number 30, both full and part timers. They also have a social worker who deals with the problem a deaf child has at home. I was glad that one boy of 16 spoke slowly. "How are you" His English was faultless, to which I replied that I was very happy to neet him. Mrs. Goldgart then explained that they had all sorts of children at the school, some retarded, some with severe disabilities besides deafness and the boys learn carpentry, fine mechanics, and the girls learn sewing and knitting. They do'nt believe in severe punishment for unruly children. Those who are naughty are put in a special room of their own to calm themselves and others of more temperamental natures are put to the chicken pen to feed the animals. This soothes them and later they are put in charge of the animals.

They also have a large garden but no gardeners. The pupiles themselves root the soil and plant seed. I was anazed to learn that the pupils have their own band, not to make them music minded, but to understand the full extent and value of vibrations. For those pupils who qualify after sixteen years og age, they go to a special training school for the deaf to learn various trades and they stay at the hostel of the Bet Helen Keller that offers room for 60 pupils. In some way I am pleased with the outlook provided at the Niv School as I feel that in some years to come, they will be the backbone of the new generation for the Helen Keller Club and thus paving the way to more oralism at the Club.

I was also pleased that the information given that in fact some of the pupils have graduated so well and were able to studt further at the Galluadet University for the Deaf in Washington D.C. Any of our members wishing to visit this school in the near future, should do so.

Mrs. Goldgart was formerly the teacher of Eva Mansell and succeeded to her present job when Mrs. Betty Miller retired. Mrs. Goldgart is doing a splendid job and is popular with all the children and staff. Devoted in giving the children real purpose in overcoming their delicate handicap. Some of the difficult children are specially trained by a speech therapist and it has proved such an enourmous success. One can only wish for the very best of luck for those that have the children at heart.

FIRE

In his talk on Fire prevention, Fire Officer R. Banks spoke of fires that occurred at many old large houses that had been turned into rooms and let out. Such houses are very bad from the viewpoint of fire prevention as the central staircase made of wood often turns into a roaring chimney drawing up fires from the ground floor and trapping these on the upper floors. Also the old houses have a lot of imflamable wood panelling, staircases, furniture and no flameproof doors or means of fire-fighting. Since most home fires start in the kitchen, he advised the prchase of and keeping in the kitchen a 6 X 6 ft square terylene fire-resistant blanket to be used to smother the fire before it gets out of hand. Fires also often start in the lounge where a careless cigarette butt is dropped into the uphostery and left to smoulder for a few hours before bursting into flames in the early hours of the morning.

In times of fire many people are liable to panic, not knowing what to do first. Strange as it may seem, phoning the fire brigade is not the first thing to do, but to make sure that everyone is out of the home or building, especially the old people who may not hear the alarm and are slow in movement. Don't let them stay behind to gather their belongings GET THEM ALL OUT, shut the doors to delay the spread of fire and THEN call the fire brigade.

Since by now all the Deaf seem to have television sets, discussion then centred around the safety of the T.V. sets since people are apt to leave papers or magazines overlapping the backs of the sets which could heat up from the heat given by the tubes and bursting into flames, also the bad habit of placing the sets in the corner of the room which does not help the T.V. set to cool down quickly before you go to bed.

Of his ten years in the fire brigade, Officer Banks spent three years in Brixton with it's large coloured population. Overcrowding into rooms many of the people are careless in the use of paraffin heaters, filling them up while the flames are on, spilling paraffin on to the hot metal, placing wet clothes to dry out over the heater, leaving the room whilst children play around and knocking over the heater and placing the heater on the staircase.

The BEST way of preventing a fire is not to let it happen and you can learn a lot from the booklet'DANGER FROM FIRE' whichFire Officer R.Banks gave to everyone in the audience.

Remember many smart alicks who are smart enough not to ask the fire brigade for free advice on fire safetly in the home are smart enough to spend many months in the hospital burns unit.

In law, if a child is allowed into a room with an unguarded fire or heater and is severely burned, you can be prosecuted and fined.

'The Breakthrough Trust Talk and Film Show'

When David Jackson came to the Club with his wife, David Hyslop and Dawn Jarrett, co-workers of the Trust, he told me that our Club was the first one to see the films outside the Trust group. The first film deals with the need for and use of the Teleprinter and Phonetype which enables the Deaf to communicate with each other over the ordinary Post Office telephone service like a personal Telex. But such apparatus does cost a lot of money. £165 plus VAT or £20 plus VAT rental per quarter, plus cost of installation and rent of a Post Office telephone. Some members were insistent that the Club should have one. Good and fine - but for whom? And who to communicate with ?. In. U.S.A. there are over 5,000 units in use as of 1964. I dont know as to how many there are now in U.S.A or in England. We will have to wait and see how things are in the future.

I think that the other films dealing with the Holiday Projects for the multihandicapped deaf children are more important. Because they showed the most important idea and spirit of the Breakthrough Trust, the idea of the Deaf helping the Deaf. In the past it was the well meant hearing people who helps the "deaf and dumb" mutes, making things easy for them with their own deaf clubs, low paid easy manuel jobs and in general cushioning them from the harsh outer workd, and thus unfortunately effectively isolating the deaf from stimulating contact and experience with the hearing peopl.e

The Breakthrough Trust seeks to halt that by getting the Deaf together with the hearing to discuss their various handicaps and so get them to break out of their tight isolated world. Then to get them to help others who, through isolation has lost the spirit of self help. to replace self-pity with self-help to oneself and others. Working in the holiday home for multi-handicapped children can be very thankless and depressing since many of them has had no training or discipline at home to look after themselves. The woluntary helpers had to handfeed, put clothes on and take them dff, wash them and to carry sometof them to and frosthest onlets. But out of this the deaf helpers were able to realise that by example and fortitude, the hearing world could see that the deaf are not so dumb as is to be expected of them. And also they themselves greatly by way of compassion and charity. After the film show we made a collection amoung the members and raised £7 for future holiday projects.

Emil Stryker would like the following letter published. It came from Mr. Elexander Fleischman Executive Director of the National Congress of Jewish Deaf (U.S.A.)

My dear friends - across the seas,

Warm greetings from the National Congress of Jewish Deaf to you and the deaf Jews of your fatherland.

I am sure Mr. Chaim Apter, executive secretary of the Association of the Deaf of Israel has contacted you about the coming 1st International Congress of Jewish Deaf convention in Israel scheduled for 1977 and you are very enthusiastic about it. I am in accord with this too...but...

As a member of the U.S.A. organising committee and a spokesman for my organisation, it dawns on me that being enthusiastic and just waiting to meet in Israel is not going to be beneficial to us. I believe in prepareness, open communication and full understanding BEFORE we arrive in Israel. Time will be short there for long drawn out debates. Therefore I am taking this liberty to write to you personally and to start the ball rolling towards concrete organisation thinking.

I am sure that you will agree with me that the best time to convene in Israel is after the International Games for the Deaf is over in Romania. According to CISS President Jerald Jordan, the dates of the Games are not yet decided upon but will most likely to be held in middle or end of July of 1977 and the Israel convention should take place after the games. This will allow our Tourists the opportunity to see some of the Games before coming to Israel. There are some questions in my mind that warrants OUR utmost consideration:

Page 4

- 1- What are the sentiments of the Jewish deaf in your fatherland towards an International Congress of Jewish Deaf?
- 2- How do the hearing leaders feel about this idea?
- 3- What do you expect out of the International Congress?
- 4- How many people from your fatherland do you think will attend the Congress if there is peace in Israel by 1977?

 If unrest by 1977?
- 5- What do you think should be the aims and policy for the Congress
- 6- How often do you think the International Congress should convene -every3,4,5 yrs?
- 7- Do you believe the Congress should convene in different place like the U.S.A, England, France etc and how will the selection be made?
- 8--With all due respect for the programe outlined in Israel do you feel we should add or change the programe for future meetings?
- 9- How shall we decide the amount of financial contribution from each Country towards the Congress? also the amount of dues for individual members?
- 10-What shall be the purpose of the funds?
- 11-How shall we elect officers, how many officers, and how long will there terms be? 12-Any other worthwhile suggestions?

I hope you will spare some thoughts to this letter, discuss it with your Jewish members in your Country and then open the cannels of communication to express our thought. By so doing we will prepare ourselves with a strong unified stand when we meet in Israel.

I beg that you reply to me as you are able to - BY JUNE 1st OR BEFORE. I hope to have your replies in time to discuss them with Chaim Apter when he comes to Washington D.C. in July for the World Foderation of the Deaf and I assure you that you will hear from me again after this.

With all best wishes for successful communication between us on the above matter and if you plan to be in Washington D.C. this summer, please let me know.

The following letter was received from Norman Schamroth who is in Guyana, S. America Dear Friends,

I have been in Guyana for about 6 weeks now and it is only recently that I have settled in. I had missed home and friends and the place and people were strange at first. I had no friends my age but now I have met quite a few young people and they have taken me around to parties and plays and music concerts. At the moment it is the rainy season and since a lot of the roads are rough with pot-holes, there are many puddles and ditches to bother about. In fact the weather here is very pleasant even though it is always 80 f or more, the rain brings the coolness - it is often overcast and grey just like England. Sometimes I even shiver when the temperature drops to 79f. I am still on Christmas school holidays and go back to work on January 6th. I am teaching a class of 13 deaf children who have no other handicaps. It is proving to be very hard but I hope I'll have a better term. The heat made me tired and irritable but know that I have got used to is I hope the lessons will get better. I'm moving soon. At the moment I am living with and ex-Englishman and his Guyanese wife but she's expecting a child so I have to move. Im moving into a home with a young deaf tailor and his separated mother. I'll have to shop and cook formmyself, but that is one reason why I moved. Before I was treated like a hotel guest. Sometime this week I hope to go out of town into the country. I don't really like the town too much, I like the peace of the Country. So anyway I hope you are all well and happy I hope too that you've had a good rest from work. Have a good 1975. Marilyn Allan of Radio London: In her talk on Radio London, Marilyn spoke of how the B.B.C. got too big to bother about the ordinary people who likes to hear oftheir local gossip, neighbours news, etc. So 6 years ago it was decided to start small regional stations all over the countryside, radio studios that are small enough for its personnel to know each other, help each other to put out programmes on the air.

Programmes that are devoted to local news, gossip, information hours in which local people could phone—in directly with ideas and complaints so that they could be broadcast immediately instead of weeks that the impersonal gigantic B.B.C. would take. After working in Brighton and Bristol studios, Marilyn now works in Radio London dealing particularly with the handicapped.

Her concern is to find out about the problems of the handicapped and how they can be overcome. Radio London also ran programmes on hobbies, talks in Asian languages for immigrant families, and slo 'You don't have to be Jewish' every Sunday at 10.30.a.m. which is popular with many non-Jewish listeners.

Marilyn knows that it is difficult for the Deaf to speak at the correct level of pitch, as they cannot hear their own voices. She was pleased to notice that many schools now have a class of deaf pupils, as that way they can mix with normal hearing pupils at meal and playtimes and so learn to play their part in the hearing world.

The world of the handicapped is not always depressing, she told us several hair-raising and hilarious stories of two persons, one blind, the other wheelchair bound, who went to Kenya to see for themselves how other people live.

It is to be hoped that the many regional radio stations would stay small and personal so that they could continue to make their local listeners take a civic pride in their local towns and countryside, take a greater interest to work for the good of their neighbours.

In conclusion, Marilyn iffers to have a small party of us visit the Radio London Studio one Sunday. If so I hope that the two few members who came to hear her lively talk would get priority, not those who did'nt bother to come and then clamour to get to the Radio Studio.

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The following information from Emil Stryker came too late for the September / October Newsletter, neither was it included in the Newsletter for November. Emil particularly wants you to have this information, so here it is:

The World Congress for the Deaf

Many of our members were very surprised and delighted to receive advance information about the above project for the 1977 term, and which Mr. Apter has asked you to support.

As one of the members for this Convention, I would like to write a few notes in which Mr. Apter and I exclusively discussed this project. Some important points have to be cleared as you might want to ask some questions.

First of all the J.D.A, as the governing body of the Jewish Deaf in England will be able to select several delegates at the appropriate time prior to the Congress, persons with the experience and knowledge of internal problems of the Jewish deaf. Of course many Jewish deaf not belonging to the J.D.A. members of other Clubs. or living around the Country, are very much welcome to attend the Congress, but the J.D.A. will choose its own Representatives. This happens with the Unites States where there are several Jewish Deaf Clubs in many Cities, representatives can come only from one governing body, presumably A.N.J.C.

It was stressed that the Israelis would very much welcome from this Country more than 300, both Jewish and non Jewish deaf, as well as Hearing people who are experts in matters of Socielogy, Medicinal fields, Cultural activities and so on. We would like very much that our young members become active in sporting events in which they can take part, for this reason alone the J.D.A. should encourage a revival of the Youth Section so that our young people are eligible to take part. Apart from the Congress there will be many cultural events, Theatre for the Deaf, Art Exhibitions, and Sports Meetings. Why do we want this Congress? To establish a close liason with the Jewish deaf all over the World. There are many pressing problems such as in France, South Africa, Russia, and even in Israel itself. There are many Jewish deaf living in different countries completely isolates and cut off, and even afraid because they are Jews.

MISS JANE WILMOT A Report by Myer Solonon

Interesting job - butafter six years she had the seven year itch and felt stale. So she looked around for something better and more interesting. Why not be a Solicitor? Yes! why not indeed.

Back to University for a while, she then looked for a position as an articled clerk - the first step to being a Solicitor. She went to a Lincolns Inn law firm where the interviewing partner - on discovering she was mostly deaf, swore @@*% etc., and decided 'Deaf Dolly Definitely Undesired here! before eventually accepting her.

"Barber Extraordinary"

It was a great pity that there were no advance notice **. of the .J.D.A., A.G.M. in the Newsletter, because so few of the members turned up and we had a very interesting Guest of Honour. Mr. Stuart Saunders is an ear, nose and throat surgeon who works in St. James's Hospital, Balham that is a short ambulance ride from the R.S.J.D.C. school.

One great surprise in his speech was that surgeons in England do not have the prefix "Dr" but that they are always plain "Mr".

That is a hangover from medieval times when surgeons were lumped together with barbers not with doctors and told not to use the front doors but to go round to the rear door, tradesman for the use of.

Using a blackboard he clearly explained as to what goes on inside our ears with its different partitions so as to show the causes and reasons for deafness. It does seem incredible that in one part of the ear, there are 30,000 tiny hairs that works in a liquid transmitting sound from the air to the brain.

Answering questions he rightly pointed that he cant answer or give specific comments without knowing our medical and case histories, which can only be done by a note from our personal doctor or in the privacy of a hospital clinic. He promised to come back and give a talk on deafness and what modern surgery can do to relieve it, although he had to admit that for the majority of us it is too late.

Some years ago, Miss Brinson of the City Lit Centre for the Deaf held a Speech Therapy class at the Club. One evening she brought along some very tiny actual bones from inside the ear. Weighing less than nothing these bones called anvil and hammers had both to be pliable and harden ugh to give years and years of work hammering away in the eardrum. So naturally, these wonders of creation sometimes gave up the ghost in middle age and causes deafness in adults. As is to be expected those of us who are deaf from birth never knew the miracle of hearing the marvellous gift of sound both nature and man made.

The cry of a newly born baby, the song of a lark hovering high above ripening wheat fields, the restless surging of the waves on a rocky coast, the hiss of skis on dry powdering snow, the intricate movements of a symphony orchestra, the dry rubbing of Palm Tree fonds along a tropical seashore, the cheery puffing of a slow self-important steam railway engine chugging along a branch line inccontrast to the powerful urgent thrust of a crack passenger express pounding along at full steam with throttle fully open, stimulating conversation with persons of wisdom and learning. The crackle of autumn fallen tree leaves underneath one's shoes. The happy innocent prattle of a child. That is our Tragedy.

Britains 2,500,000 hard-of hearing-people will soon be able to watch
television with instant sub-titles.

A new system has been developed by the Independent Broadcasting Authority and researchers at Southampton University. Experimental programmes will start soon. The system uses a special machine first developed to help deaf Labour M.P. Jack Ashley.

Viewers will need a television set capable of receiving Teletext - the instant information service. At the touch of a button they will be able to call up sub-titles on to the screen. On recorded programmes sub-titles will be ready printed but for news and other live programmes they will be added simultaneously."
