Six-times top DJ saves kindest cut for minibus

Veteran broadcaster David Jacobs (bottom, right) snipped the ribbon on a new minibus donated to the Jewish Deaf Association. During his lunch visit to JDA's North Finchley day centre, the TV and radio personality talked to around 40 members about his life and work before cutting the tape.

The £35,000 16-seater is the first vehicle of its kind to be owned by the association. Executive director Sue Cipin said: "Now we can transport our elderly and disabled members living in various parts of London to and from our day centre, as well as taking them on outings and weekend breaks."

Cipin said the minibus would also benefit members of other groups, such as the Sounds Social group for the hard-of-hearing.

Jacobs, 76, has been in broadcasting for 58 years and has six times been voted Britain's top DJ. For eight years in the 1960s his Juke Box Jury was one of British television's top programmes. He now hosts Radio 2's easy-listening show late each Sunday.
