The doctors were not sure how her deafness developed, because she had convulsions and gastroenteritis in the first year of her life. Maureen was very upset about being deaf but, as time moved on, she accepted her deafness.

Maureen had ups and downs like all of us. She had good schooling at the Residential School for Jewish Deaf Children (RSJDC). She was there from 5 to 16 years old and she was very happy at school. Whilst there she made many friends and they remained her friends throughout her life until the present day.

She got married in 1971 to Roy Winterflood. They had one son, Simon, who grew up to be a nice polite person and loved his mum. He managed to overcome some difficult health problems and lives quietly with his dad Roy. Both Roy and Simon visited Maureen regularly, right up until the final week of her life.

After my husband Ralph died, I took Maureen to Tenerife and both Leslie and Maureen to Bournemouth.

Maureen loved her laptop and tablet. She booked many holidays on them. We also had wonderful cruises together. Maureen loved the beach and warm places.

We used to meet up regularly, thanks to Janet at JDA, who arranged bringing us together, along with Leslie and his cousin Sheila. We shared lots of nice times together catching up on all our news.

Maureen and Leslie enjoyed a lovely life together and made a strong bond, doing everything together.

Maureen loved reading... her favourite was Hello Magazine! She was diagnosed with Dementia in 2013 and, as her Dementia progressed, she received care at home from her beautiful carers, who loved and respected Maureen right up to her last day. My heartfelt thanks go to Tonic TLC, Toni Cox and her Angels.

Maureen loved JDA. She attended the Wednesday Deaf Club week after week, meeting up with her friends as JDA was a big part of her life. She organised Leslie's 70th birthday at JDA, attended by a lot of people, including Leslie's daughters, Debbie and Rachel from America.

Maureen got so much help, guidance and support over the years from Sue Cipin, Janet and the JDA support team and staff. I am forever grateful for that!
