

MIRIAM'S JOURNEY INTO THE SEVENTEENTH CENTURY

If you would like to see inside a royal home, but with a difference, I do recommend a visit to the Queen's House. Where? In Greenwich Park, near the National Maritime Museum. It has been extensively and beautifully restored into as how it could have looked when it was first built in 1616. Yes, all that long ago!

The house has seen many changes over the years, but the most important were in the thirties in converting the rooms into museum galleries, and in the eighties, the decision to return the house into its present form.

It seems that just about everything inside the building has been cleaned up. The only modern things are the heating system, electrical wiring and lights. I have to say I was really astonished at the marvellous brickwork of the walls and vaults in the basement which was revealed when the covering plaster was removed. This area has several large glass cabinets showing precious objects from the past and present.


Upstairs, the wall coverings, long curtains, chair seat covers and the four-poster bed draperies are sumptuous, specially woven to the exact colours and designs as far as possible to those used long ago.

Don't forget to look up at the ceilings for the wonderful decorations and paintings. One of the most breathtaking sights is the so-called Tulip Stairs, which is a long spiral staircase to the domed window at the roof level. You don't go up that way. Only after you have gone upstairs by another way and seen all the other rooms, then you go down those spiral stairs.

The exterior is very impressive and classical without any fussy touches and the park setting is just perfect. The loggia or balcony gives a great view up to the Royal Observatory.

All I can say is go and see for yourself, but it does involve a lot of walking so it may not suit older people. It is worth it to buy the reasonably priced guide book with lots of actual pictures which explains all the history of the Queen's House and of how the restoration was accomplished.


The Bar-Mitzvah was a memorable occassion, & we were 'walking on air' for at least a week after the event!

The recent BJDSO AGM saw some changes in the committee as follows :-

It has been necessary to arrange an Extraordinary General Meeting (EGM) because the accounts have not yet been audited. The agenda will consist of two main items which are :-



Environmental Issues on March 29th at 7pm



Anti-Semitism in the Deaf Community on April 26th

If you have been to one of those 1880 debates and enjoyed it, then we will have something similar at the JDA. The only difference will be that we will all sit in a circle in the hall. In this way we will all feel comfortable and not under any pressure like going on the stage.

The debate will be about the anti-semitism in the deaf community in the United Kingdom. We need to explore this by raising points –

- ✗ The things we don't like to hear – like being called Jews rather than Jewish people or being stereotyped as people with big noses, thick bottom lips, hunchbacks, bags under the eyes.
- ✗ The things we are not happy about – like losing friends as soon as they learn that we are Jewish
- ✗ The things we don't like to read about – like some of the newspapers blaming Israel for its stand when they don't think why Israel had to take action like imposing a curfew in the West Bank.
- ✓ The things we would like to see – better awareness of our culture and Jewish traditions in the British Deaf Community.
- ✓ The things we would like to do – let our non-Jewish friends mix with us as much as possible.
- ✓ The things we would like to hope for – change the stereotyped attitudes towards us by the non-Jewish deaf people

There is plenty more to talk about so come along and have an interesting evening. It is hoped that a video film will be made of the debate for future references.

Dear readers,

It's a great honour for me to write an article in the newsletter. My friend, Martin Bogard, had asked me to write about me and my life in Sweden.

My name is Moshe Levy, a swedish Jewish deaf young man and I am 22 years old.

I was born and bred in a little City of Västerås 130 Kilometres north-west of Sweden's capital Stockholm with population of 120,000. I went to a hearing school for 7 years and I was not the only deaf person. There were another 5 deaf children attended. I did not have a good education during my time in the hearing school and other children teased me. One day in the spring, my class attending a public swimming bath, on our way to the bath, a mischievous boy suddenly pushed me for no reason and I fell down and hit the kerb. Minutes later an ambulance came and took me to the hospital as I was unconscious for a few minutes and had ten stiches on my crown. I was then 13 years old.

Two woman curators of the deaf from Örebro and Stockholm came to my school and had a discussion with me and the other deaf pupils about our future school and I was advised to move to a deaf school in Örebro which we found it very helpful and benifit.

After having a wonderful summer holiday, my family was moving to Örebro and I began my study in a comprehensive school for 2 years along with other deaf pupils which I have never had this kind of experience before. Naturally I could not communicate by sign-language and found a bit difficult however the other pupils had been so kind to me and trying to teach me the sign-language. (But today I am still learning the sign-language. I go out and meet the deaf people to improve my sign-language.)

In my last year at the comprehensive school, we deaf pupils had to decide which education we want to be in the secondary school. However I chose technical subject and I was with other 2 deaf students admitted to technical school where there were 30 normal hearing students for 5 years. After 3 years we have studied in theoretic and began to do some practically work which I have chosen electronic as my subject.

In the midsummer all parents came and congratulates us on our final year at the secondary school. We had a wonderful festival in Swedish style. I have decided to continue with my study and I was admitted to Uppsala University 60 kilometre north of Stockholm to study architectural course which I am doing now and hopefully I will be taking the examination in 2 or 3 years time.

I would like to tell you more about the Jewish deaf in Sweden. There are 8 Jewish deaf whom I know. In my synagogue, in Stockholm, there are 5 deaf who attended, two of them are lovely girls!!! We usually go to non-jewish deaf club in Stockholm in the evening.

I believe there will be more Jewish deaf who are coming from Russia to attend my synagogue.

We have a new rabbi from Israel and he is learning the sign-language for the benifit of us to be able to follow the service when needed be. I am pleased that he really enjoyed in learning the sign-language.

Recently I heard a couple in the synagogue who had a sweet baby boy and he is deaf, so that is adding to the jewish deaf population of Sweden!!!

There are only 20,000 Jews in Sweden and only 9,000 are member of any synagogues. We have jewish schools where they can learn the jewish cluture, study and of-course Hebrew

The Stockholm Synagogue was a gift from our Swedish King Gustav III. and it was built in 1755. We are very proud of it.

You may think "Oh, what a question to ask?" Well, let us consider this piece of news that was in a recent issue of the Jewish Chronicle about a Jewish teacher on a visit to Ghana.

He went there as a teacher to help with the education. One evening over a drink he somehow informed his associates that he was Jewish. One of them told him that there is a Jewish tribe somewhere in the country. Of course this teacher was amazed. He thought there were no Jewish people living in an African country like Ghana.

He was taken to meet this tribe and was astonished to find that this tribe practises the Judaism faith and that the black Jews are very proud of their culture as much as we are with ours. There are about 200 Jewish Ghanians and it is not at all mentioned in the Jewish Travel Guide.

He knew nothing about the Jewish Deaf Association and of course I gave him all the information. But this made me wonder if he is one of the many in other parts of the country who needs to be reached.

Dear Mr Binysh

Thank you for your letter of 17 January about the Public Teletext applications.

By now you should have received copies of the Public Teletext applications which I hope will allow you to make further comment.

I note in your letter some concern for teletext subtitles; I can assure you that the licensing of teletext will not affect the provision of subtitles. We have placed this particular requirement upon the Channel 3 and Channel 4 licensees, in fact by 1998 all companies must increase their subtitling to an average of 50% of programmes each week. In addition the ITC will be carefully monitoring the subtitling output not only to ensure the correct amount of programmes will carry subtitles but also that the quality will remain high.

The further good news is that after 1998 the ITC will require the companies to keep on increasing their subtitled output, year by year.

Thank you for taking the trouble to write to us and I hope the above will go some way to reassure you subtitling is secure in the years ahead.

The new free-line number, **0800 243355**, cannot guarantee an immediate reply, as all the operators may already be occupied. However, it will ensure that minicom callers will be given absolute priority over all other customers and their call will be taken immediately an operator becomes free.
