We are trying to improve the Club's programme, and also trying to arrange them well in advance ie. to improve our system and to ensure the members are well informed of what is going on.

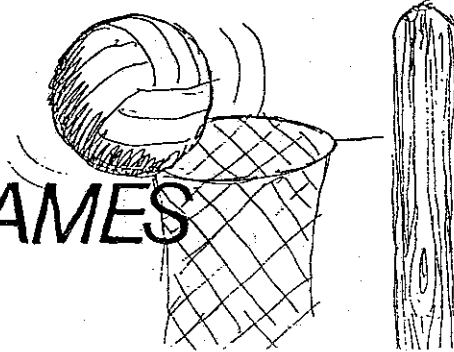
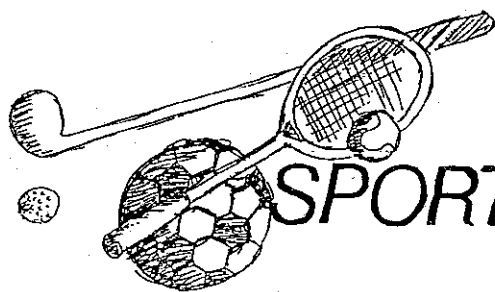

A SATISFIED CUSTOMER WRITES.....

On February 25th 1987 all records were broken when the Wednesday Club was packed largely due to the Xmas and half term school holidays.

All those mums who brought their kids were very lucky because the JDA Chef provided on the same day a very excellent lunch, in fact one of the best we had for a long time and I am sure the kids appreciated the difference from the ordinary school meals.

At the same time I could not help feeling sorry for poor Issy Michaels who celebrated his 21st birthday, it is always customary to celebrate by treating all those present at the Wednesday club with sweets or chocs and poor Issy did not expect such a large crowd. Auntie Pat must have felt very relieved that Issy managed to cope giving out all the sweets. After the excellent lunch we went up to the Jimmy Cohen Hall to welcome Mr. Paul Bookbinder who for some years was working in the Ladies department, but later promoted to Public Relations Officer at Marks & Spencer. We were very pleased to listen via the fine interpreting of Jessie Jessel and the loop system the warm human story of the history of Marks and Spencer. We were very thrilled by the story of how a penniless Jew emigrated from Russia at the turn of the century and became a multi-millionaire by building up the famous Marks and Spencer chain at home and abroad.

The bosses did not forget those who helped them with their business in the early days especially a female clerk who was employed at Marks and Spencer Head Office, but later left. Many of the people at Head Office thought she had emigrated to Australia, so when later Marks and Spencer celebrated their centenary they remembered this clerk, but could not trace her. However some time after a phone call from a Manchester Hospital came to the Head Office of Marks and Spencer. They said that a very old lady has just come around after a big operation and kept muttering the name of Marks and Spencer. Mr Bookbinder went to the hospital and found it was the missing clerk. Marks and Spencer went into action, they bought a bungalow and furniture for the lady and provided her with a big pension. This was indeed a very warm human story and many of us are indeed very grateful to Auntie Pat, Auntie Tilly and Auntie Marie Madden for organising for all of us such a wonderful day.

We very much regret passing of our member Len Godfrey after a long and distressing illness.



Michael Marks could not have dreamt how big or world famous his penny stall would become after he had arrived here from Slonim in the Russuan Polish province of Grodno and unable to speak a word of English, but he made a very good friend in Isaac Dewhirst who helped him to set up in business with items from his wholesale warehouse. It could so very easily have been Marks and Dewhirst instead of Marks and Spencer. The names seem to go together perfectly.

Mr Paul Bookbinder who is a Public Relation man at Michael House Baker Street, talked to the Wednesday Club about how he realised in 1982 that 1984 would be the centenary of Marks and Spencer. He told Lord Sieff the present Chairman and grandson of Michael Marks who promptly gave him the job of researching the story from the beginning. A difficult job as there was very little information about the earliest years.

He looked up the archives, records, notebooks, documents, diaries, letters, he scoured the country for employees who had served in the stalls, markets and stores in bygone years.

One of the most interesting parts of the enthralling talk was the story of Esther Brown. A very seriously ill women in the Manchester Jewish Hospital wanted to know why no one from Marks and Spencer had come to see her? The medical staff discovered that she was the very first assistant hired to work on a market stall. Before that she had been a mother's help in the Marks family, starting at the age of 14. She rose to be a manageress in Manchester until 1911 when she left to get married and emigrated Down Under. She returned home before the last war. The Company was told about her and she was given a pension and a flat. She lived for another seven years before dying at the age of 91. So her story had a happy ending.

Marks and Spencer have a very good welfare scheme. We were shown some enlarged photographs of the places and people in the story. The talk was only up to the deaths of both partners, Tom Spencer in 1905 and Michael Marks two years later at the unexpectedly early age of 48, but they laid the foundations of Marks and Spencers as we know it today.

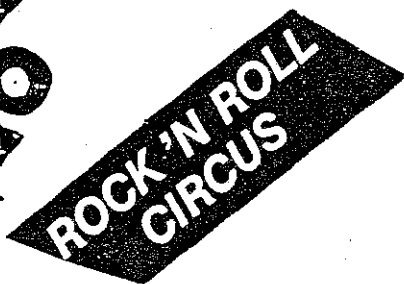

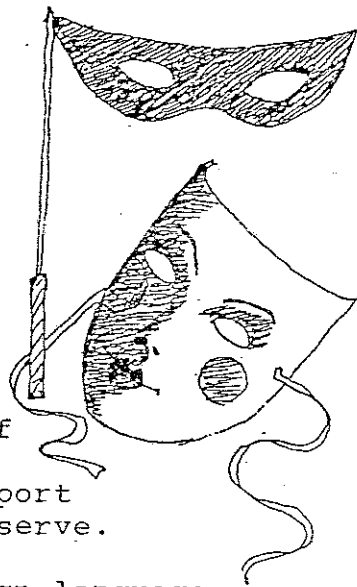
On 26th February, 26 of us had tickets to go to the Hackney Empire which has opened up again as a Music Hall, which was a Bingo Hall for quite a number of years.
